Okay, here's the deal. Years ago a business colleague said, "Suzanne, we do the best we can with the resources we have." So I will keep on tossing opportunities your way. Opportunities to be involved at the Region level, meet new people, learn new skills. Opportunities to take on a new responsibility in your club (even something nobody has done before!), to try new ideas on for size, to reach out in your community on behalf of women and girls. All with our eyes on the prize: vibrant, active, fun clubs that are part of investing in the dreams of half a million women and girls in the next 10 years. And remembering that we do the best we can with the resources we have, I invite you to try some of these opportunities and, as Governor-Elect Chari said at Region Conference, Dare to Suck! (because you won't actually suck, you know? you are awesome)



One in three women and girls experience physical or sexual violence in their lifetime, most frequently by an intimate partner.

One hundred thirty-seven women are killed by a member of their family every day.

Fewer than 40 per cent of the women who experience violence seek help of any sort.

25 November is **The International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women**, and the first day of the 16 Days of Activism against gender-based violence.

The **16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence** is an annual international campaign that kicks off on 25 November and runs until 10 December, **Human Rights Day**. It was started by activists at the inaugural Women's Global Leadership Institute in 1991 and continues to be coordinated each year by the Center for Women's Global Leadership. It is used as an organizing strategy by individuals and organizations around the world to call for the prevention and elimination of violence against women and girls. Save the date for a Canada-wide webinar on December 3.

Every October, our club partners with several other community groups, including Chilliwack Victim Services, Wilma's Transition House, Chilliwack Fire Fighters and Chilliwack RCMP to participate in Domestic Violence Awareness month. The international awareness campaign invites residents and businesses to shine a string or purple light bulb on their front porch or front window to help shine a light on domestic violence and that it has NO place in our community.

SI of the Langleys has been hosting a candlelight vigil for over twenty years to recognize the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. On November 25 we will once again be gathering to raise awareness of this issue and to offer support to the women who are victimized by these crimes.

Nearly 1 in 3 women have been abused in their lifetime. In times of crises, the numbers rise, as seen during the COVID-19 pandemic and recent humanitarian crises, conflicts and climate disasters.

Please join us for this very important event, and dress for the weather, as it will be held outside (usually around 6:00 pm) Location and exact time will be posted on our Facebook page and on the Western Canada Region Facebook page closer to the date.





SI of Central Alberta was chartered in 1988, by SI Calgary. We are a small but mighty club and since our inception we have granted 48 Live Your Dream awards, 21 Violet Richardson awards, and 23 Ruby Awards to women and girls in our community. Our past world famous club fundraiser was the original Pyjamas and Pearls event, envied for the fabulous Elvis tribute artist we loved to have perform!

In 2016, our club brought the Purple Light Nights

campaign to Alberta and we have won a Celebrating Success award regionally for it. This campaign has grown tremendously with many municipalities, individuals, and organizations shining



purple lights, making declarations for Family Violence Awareness Month, wearing our purple shirts, buying our purple wreaths and lights, and joining to create awareness that Domestic Violence has NO place in our community.

In 2021, we received a grant from the Red Deer and District Community Foundation and the Fund for Gender Equality for the Period Promise Pilot Project. We partnered with the United Way of Central Alberta and brought the Period Promise to Alberta. Our pilot equipped 4 schools in the Red Deer Public School District with dispensers and free menstrual products in every washroom. Cross country coverage was achieved, as were connections with other menstrual equity advo-



cates, and since then the Government of Alberta has funded 50 more schools in the province, based on the results Central Alberta achieved. The Period Promise Pilot Project received a Celebrating Success award regionally and also a Mayors Recognition award from the City of Red Deer. SI of Central Alberta itself received a 2021 Education and Engagement award from the United Way of Central Alberta. Two municipalities in Central Alberta, two libraries, and many businesses and organizations have started to sup-

ply free menstrual products in their facilities. The Period Promise Dress was also created by two amazing artists in Central Alberta and was worn by one of our members at the Mayors Recognition awards and displayed during Alberta Culture Days.



We are excited that we have been recent recipients of grants for our Live Your Dream awards. We are in the running for \$4000.00 from Field Law 2022 Community Fund Program. Please vote for our club project until November 10, 2022, once on each of your devices please!!!

We have all had a couple of challenging years adapting to a world with a pandemic and even though covid is still with us, we are returning to life as it was before covid with travel and in-person meetings.

On June 24, 2022, the Supreme Court of the United States overturned Roe v Wade. In essence, the Supreme Court decided that each state could determine their own abortion laws. As we know, many states have adopted very restrictive laws essentially making abortion next to impossible.

This caused, understandably, and uproar not only in the US, but around the world. It caused our federation SIA, to put out a statement.: <u>https://</u> <u>blog.soroptimist.org/blog/sia-statement-on-roe-vwade</u>

SIA has decided to sit on the fence so as not to upset some members.

Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., is a global organization with a diverse membership whose opinions on this matter span the full political spectrum.

During this time of political division, let us remain united by the Soroptimist mission, ensuring that every woman and girl has the opportunity to pursue an education, achieve economic empowerment, and live her dreams.

What has followed, are discussions around the federation, and in this Region about what does it mean to advocate. Does taking a stand mean we are political and, can we be political. As we start our Soroptimist year, I would like to address those questions and look at what our purpose is.

Soroptimist International states its purpose as:

Advocating for human rights and gender equality, at the heart of Soroptimist International's advocacy is its work across seven UN Centres, where our UN representatives ensure that the voices of women and girls are heard. Our membership work on grassroots projects that help women and girls achieve their individual and collective potential, realise aspirations and have an equal voice in communities worldwide.

The principles of Soroptimist International:

The principles of Soroptimist are to strive for: • The advancement of the status of women • High ethical standards • Human rights for all • Equality, development and peace and • The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace.

Advocacy is the act or process of supporting a cause or proposal. Any advocacy work we do must promote the principles of Soroptimist. And this will likely mean taking an unpopular position. As Soroptimists, we want to improve the lives of women and girls. We cannot do that by kowtowing to society or one political belief IF that belief does not support the best for women.

Advocacy means that we challenge law makers and politicians. We write to MP, MLA's and municipal officials. This has nothing to do with being partisan. Is the overturning of Roe v Wade wrong? Are women harmed as a result? If the answer is yes, then we MUST take stand. That is who we are.

Please consider what issue you would like the Region to address through advocacy. This can include issues that you would like to discuss. Let's make a difference for women and girls in Western Canada.

Take care of yourselves and each other.

Mona is a member of the Canada West Online club.


This summer, Dr. Poonam Kochhar (SI Surrey Delta) connected with Soroptimists during her

A Conversaton with Haley Serrano, Soroptimist International of Saskatoon.

It is always refreshing for me to see what my fellow Soroptimists are doing. Let me introduce you to Haley Serrano, a member of Soroptimist International of Saskatoon and a friend of mine. Haley is a young woman with ambition, integrity and empathy for all. It's been wonderful working with her these past few years and I love learning more about these young leaders. Haley and I had a brief conversation about her latest educational experience and it went like this.

Where were you studying?

The Columbia Journalism School based in New York City offers a 4-week course called the Columbia Publishing Course. It is a fourweek intensive course in all aspects of book publishing. They offer the course at Columbia University in New York, and a sister program hosted in the UK by Oxford. I was offered a placement in either, but of course, couldn't resist the opportunity to study at Oxford University!

What were you studying?

Publishing! The course consisted of several daily lectures from professionals in the industry. This included editors, literary agents, designers, publicists, and even authors. Each shared the path they took to get into the literary world, and the valuable lessons they have learned on the way.

Why this path of education?

Books have always been my passion! From spending free time as a teenager volunteering at my local library to a degree in English literature, and five years spent working in a bookstore, this was my dream program. I don't think I realized until just a couple of years ago that I could turn my passion into a career by pursuing publishing.

Did you like England?

Oxford is truly one of my new favorite places in the world. It is filled with history, has the most beautiful buildings, and the lifestyle is so lovely. Exeter College (where I studied) includes notable alumni such as J.R.R. Tolkien and Sir Phillip Pullman!

Tell me a it about what you did while not studying?

Spare time at Oxford was filled with walks around the city, high tea, trips to the local bookstores and coffee shops, museums, libraries, and nights with friends in cozy pubs.

What are you hoping to do now?

I am open to all the possibilities! Ideally, I would like to work in marketing for a publishing house, but I would be happy to work with books in any capacity. Publishing in Saskatchewan is limited, so I could end up elsewhere in Canada or maybe back in the UK.

I first heard about Soroptimist through my grandmother, Melanie Kenny, who has been a very involved Soroptimist.
